PRINCE OF WALES COMPANY.

THE BATTLE OF HECHTEL SEP 7th to 12th.

It is intended that this shall only be the story of the part played by Prince of Wales Coy in the Battle of Hechtel, but all Coys were so closely involved that in order to give a clear picture it will be necessary to tell much of what happened to them.

On 7 Sep 2 Sqn, 2 W.G. and No 3 Coy advanced from Helchteren towards Hechtel but were unable to continue the mills which were unable to the mills with the second of the

towards Hochtol, but were unable to get into the village owing to

strong enemy opposition.

On 8 Sep it was planned that an attack should be put in by POW Coy and X Coy. Much information was available owing to gallantry of the patriots who went into the village, noted all onemy positions and then returned to us. It was evident that the villago was strongly hold. The scheme was that a feint attack shoul bo put in on the right flank by a section of carriers and mortars. A troop of Irish Guards was to cut the road running East from the village. No 2 Sqn was to shell the village from the South and move up on consolidation. An artillory concentration of 15 minutes was laid on and typhoons to bomb the village (only four turned up much to out disgust). The main attack was to come in from the West, POW Coy on the right and X Coy on the left. The objectives were the West side of the village, the main read running West to East being inclusive to X Coy.

Wo moved forward embussed, with a little delay caused by the enemy. We debused and marched to our start line. The artillery concentrationedid not last long enough, and so we had to ask for it

to continuo longor.

All wont well until we reached some very flat open ground six hundred yards wide just before the village. This was sweet by M G fire. No. 5 Pl tried to attack straight across this. They overranged macked out one M.G. western are suffered some resulties. After this they were placed down. A plan was made to attack under a smoke screen, but this was called off when it was discovered that X Coy had got on on the left. I decided to follow through them. We therefore crossed the main read. After a recognification and They ovorran had got on on the left. I decided to follow through them. we therefore crossed the main road. After a recee I decided to send No. 1 Fl down the left side of the main road, straight into the village. They got in without much opposition and were followed by No. 3 Fl. While this was goin on we were being shelled by an enemy tank from behind. I then followed up with No. 2 Fl and Coy H.Q. The leading Fls were held up in the village as was X Coy, No. 2 Fl. reached its objective and started to dig in. Nos 1 and 3 Fls eventually pushed on as far as the main road running North and South, but could not cross it. During this opisode Lt Hugh Mitchlement and the took shelter with same civilians and was later brough was wounded (He tood sholter with some civilians and was later brough back to us by two Gorman stretcher bearers) and the three men with him were killed. I tried to get No 2 Sqn up to assist us to push forward to the Eastern edge of the village. When eventually I did go hold of them I found that they only had three banks left. Major John Spencer, Lt David Rogers and myself went forward to a house in the main street which was a good 0.P. It was beginning to get dark and we suddenly saw a number of Germans in the street just outside. They spotted us at the window and started firing their M.G. through the window at us. I throw a grounde and can be three magazines from the Bren which enabled us to get out of the house. I then decided to draw the Terward Pls back to No. 3 Pl area and form a firm base on the South Western sector to the village with the mass setisfactorily done.

This was satisfactorily done. During the night the enemy came out in full force and infiltrated righ into the Coy erea. Major John Spencer was unfortunately killed and one Gdsm; and four were captured. However, we took a good tell of the enemy. My 2-in-C, Capt Sir E. Bedingfold, myself and some others were in a house intthe Coy area when the enemy arrived at the door and throw a grounde at the window. We managed to dedge out as it was so dark they could not see if we we some of their own men or

not. My operator got into a scap box in the collar.
